June Meeting Minutes

June Meeting - June 11, 2020

Larry Lemons called the meeting to order at 6:02pm, and welcomed guests, as well as welcomed back members after two months of lock-down due to the pandemic. He also welcomed back Angela White after her Amazon stint in Arizona - and bid goodbye to Jody McCabe, who has now completed her move to Tennessee. Gale gave a report on Liz Bower, who had successfully completed knee replacement surgery on her 2nd knee, and was now home. Gwen gave the Treasurer's Report: As of the end of last month, we had \$4.125.76 in the bank. This amount does not reflect pending receipts and expenses for Soon Warren's workshop, as the workshop doesn't conclude until June 12th. It appears that with all the cancellations for Covid. only 11 people were attending the workshop, and the CTAA stood to earn "maybe \$100" from the event - a far cry from previous years' earnings of around \$1500 for each workshop. Next year, hopefully, we'll be back to normal. Due to her move, Jody resigned as Secretary. Motion was made to accept her resignation by Gale Cochran Smith / seconded by Karen Kennedy Chatham - with Gale temporarily assuming the duties of Secretary until a permanent appointment can be made next month. Much of the meeting centered on members' activities during the past two months, whether art-related or not: • Larry Lemons had received one commission to paint a large 3'x4' rat for a local barbershop, had gained maybe 10 pounds and lost muscle mass as his life centered on his brown recliner and home renovations. He had also written a book and received two painting commissions. • Judy Lemon announced that she had sold her flower shop to her daughter-in-law, who was moving to Nocona from Bowie. She had actively painted during the lock down. • Jody McCabe had sold her house during the lock down and moved to Tennessee. She was back in town for the Soon Warren workshop, and will be back for the September art show. • Vonnie Kohn had friends visiting from Canada that ended up staying for much of the quarantine time. Jesse Coulson preached his last sermon at his church before the lock down, and then preached the first sermon when they opened back up. They had minor damage from the tornado in Bowie. He and Gwen had started an online store to sell their photographs, books and jewelry. They announced that Jess was turning 80 on July 11th, and there would be a reception at the Seventh Day Adventist Church in Bowie to celebrate. • Jennifer Hammer had baked a ton of bread during the lock down, and shopped for her mother-in-law. • Gale Cochran-Smith had written a book on the North Oil Field, was in the process of finishing a book on the Taovayas Indians, and had helped the County Historical Commission publish two books. She has done no art at all during the lock down because she wasn't in the right frame of mind. • Karen Kennedy- Chatham had to close her hair salon, but sold several paintings and received one commission for a horse painting. Art saved the day! She plans a trip to Utah and other states in July to photograph horses. • Darlene McCord worked on cataloging over 400 albums as well as worked on new songs for her fiddle and piano. A photograph of her playing the fiddle was on the cover of the 2019 Montague County Visitors Guide. Larry announced that the meeting next month would likely be a presentation by Rick Schaub, a wood sculpture artist. Other meetings are fluid at this point, and hopefully will be finalized by next month. The tour of the Tales 'N' Trails Museum will be worked in, depending on the scheduling of other artist presenters. Larry had received an animated DVD about Vincent Van Gogh from Bridgeport artist Melanie Singleton, and it may be a "Movie Night" for November's meeting. Our Christmas party will be in December as usual. Our art show in October with Nocona Nights is "up in the air" and won't be decided on for a few weeks when Nocona Nights meets. Our art show in Bridgeport, which was canceled twice due to Covid, is now scheduled for September for Bridgeport's "Taste of Bridgeport" event - date is pending. Artist of the Month was voted on, and won by Judy Lemon for her watercolor painting titled "Walking Home." Meeting was adjourned at 7:20pm Respectfully submitted: Gale Cochran-Smith 06/13/20

If you are a paid-up member of your local art club or guild, you are welcome to enter our annual Lake Country Show in Graham, hosted by the Graham Art Guild and presented at the Old Post Office Museum and Art Center (OPOMAC). The show will hang from July 27 through August 29, 2020, 510 3rd Street in Graham, TX 76450

Registration at the OPOMAC - 9 to 4 July 24 & 25

Pickup Artwork all day August 29, 2020

\$35 entry fee for up to 3 pieces Each additional entry is \$15

Oils-Acrylics-Watercolors
Pastels- 3-Dimensional Works-Photography
Pencil/Pen-Experimental Works

Classwork must be marked as such; classwork is eligible for ribbon awards but not cash awards.

All artwork must be original, created within the last two years, and not have been shown at the OPOMAC previously. Pieces must be framed or on gallery- wrapped canvas or board; ALL must be wired for hanging - no sawtooth hangers or masking tape.

Pieces must be for sale; there shall be a 20% commission paid to the Graham Art Guild on all sales.

Although great care is taken to protect your artwork during the hanging of the show, the museum and the art guild cannot be held responsible for any accidental damage.
