Chisholm Trail Art Association Meeting Minutes

February 11, 2017

President Gale Cochran-Smith opened the meeting. There were some general comments before our guest artist gave his presentation.

- Our guest artist, Joshua Bradley, had offered a small bowl as a door prize
- Gale reminded all that dues were due based on your month of joining to check the membership roster
- The Treasurer's report showed we had \$549.20 in the treasury
- Gale reminded all that we have a \$500 scholarship due in May
- Scholarship Chair, Jack Milchanowski, said all county art teachers have the paperwork for scholarships, and we will have at least one applicant from Nocona. He also stated that mention of the scholarship has been made in the paper, and on Face Book. Jack also mentioned that the money would be distributed through the individual's college.
- More discussion on the CTAA juried Western Art Show and Sale. Deadline for entries is June 1, 2017. The show runs from July 1-August 15, 2017. Jack gave more information the show is open to all media as long as it represents the late 1800s and relates to the cattle drives of that time. Someone asked about crochet work and braided jewelry Jack said as long as it fits the time period and theme, it's acceptable.
- Gale mentioned we have 2 rooms to fill in the museum and a discussion followed on floor and wall space.
- All art associations within 500 mile radius have been notified about the show.
- Reminder to notify Jennifer Hammer who has been sent post cards.
- Mention that Ben Jacobi, storm chaser/photographer, will be our guest artist at the March meeting on March
 9, 2017
- Reminder that Soon Warren's workshop will be held July 26-28, 2017, at \$150 with \$50 down at the time of reservation. The workshop will be cut off at 15 people, so we were reminded to reserve our spots.

Joshua Bradley from Wichita Falls, does segmented wood turning. Joshua found interest in wood turning through his profession – he is a carpenter. He took left over pieces of wood home, and his grandparents bought him a lathe. He's self-taught and learned his art by reading books on the subject and browsing the internet. He started wood turning around 2000, and gave us a brief history on his technique on shaping the wood by layering – one layer at a time, gluing, and in some cases he handed sanded to achieve a certain thickness. His bowls were beautiful, and he passed them around so we could feel them. He also coats them with wipe-on poly, because he believes the wood should be handled. Some of the woods he uses are tropical red from South America, purple heart, South American Walnut, pecan wood, hickory, canary wood, mesquite, and yellow hart. He doesn't use green wood, because they will dry and split.

- After his presentation, we gathered around the table and further discussed his work. Jesse Coulson won the door prize for the small bowl.

Debbie Malone won Artist of the Month for using tumbleweed in her art.







The Merrell Saga is a historical novel about the complicated but true story of a frontier family in the Mississippi Territory of the early 1800's.

In July of 1813, America's war against the British Empire had been in progress for just over a year. In the Mississippi Territory, thousands of American settlers feared for their lives as the nearby Red Stick faction of the Muscogee Creeks threatened to align with Great Britain. When the Mississippi Territorial government sends out calls for volunteers to join the militia to defend the country from attack, Jack Merrell, a young husband and father, is torn between duty to his family and duty to his country. The decision that he makes will forever change the trajectory of his life and the lives of his family members.

Jack and his wife, Sarah, separated by bizarre and unique circumstances, each experience hardships and tragedies which propel their lives into different directions. The stories of their individual struggles of survival, perseverance, and redemption lead to a heart-rending reunion that is extraordinarily unique in the chronicles of American pioneer history.

Ben Jacobi is a nature photographer and storm chaser from North Texas. Ben first became interested in severe weather growing up in Iowa Park Texas—right in the heart of Tornado Alley. In 2009 when he was 20 years old, he chased his first storm. Ben is inspired by the power and majesty of the thunderstorms. On his own, he has studied Meteorology to enhance his knowledge of how thunderstorms evolve and behave. Each year he drives hundreds of miles across the southern plains pursing dramatic supercells.

Jacobi is a self-taught photographer who learned his craft through reading books, magazines, internet articles, and experimentation. His work has appeared in galleries around Texas including Amarillo, Wichita Falls, and Breckenridge. He has had his work published in Nature's Best Photography Magazine and the Wichita Falls Literature and Art Review.

Ben is currently the co-president of the Red River Photography Club and a member of the Red River Image Cooperative. He has also had memberships with The Wichita Falls Art Association, Kemp Center for the Arts, North American Nature Photography Association, and Texas Photographic Society.

My photography is capturing that elusive moment in nature when light, shade, color, contrast and subject all come together in a harmonious display. This fusion, captured in a second, is what fuels my passion for the art. As a nature photographer, I feel it is my purpose to document the majesty and mystery of creation. Towards that end, I strive to create images that inspire and resonate. I am especially fascinated by dramatic thunderstorms and the infinite cosmos. I enjoy the challenge of the pursuit and then capturing the final result. Nature can be unpredictable, so the task demands planning and perseverance. Sometimes this means strategizing the safest and fastest route to circumvent the storm, or camping under a canopy of uncountable stars to capture that image—the unforgettable shot. The photograph starts before I press the shutter.



Chisholm Trail Art Association Information



In January 2007, a group met together in the old county jail building on the square in Montague for the purpose of identifying area visual artists and finding out what kind of art was being created around the area once known as the Chisholm Trail.

The enthusiasm generated from this first meeting led to the formation of the Chisholm Trail Art Association. Made up of artists and art lovers from all walks of life, the group includes photographers, hobbyists, both professional and amateur artists and patrons who are passionate about creating and promoting art.

ART is a form of human activity appealing to the imagination - especially drawing, painting, and sculpture, but also including architecture, poetry, music, and dance.

ART often requires the use of mathematics, science, anatomy, history, time management, physical conditioning, keen observation, financial management and budgeting, and much more.

ART can transcend cultural, social, racial, religious and language barriers.

One who practices ART does a good thing.

ART takes courage ... yes, COURAGE!

The Chisholm Trail Art Association pays homage to its namesake, the Chisholm Trail. Although only in existence from about 1867 to 1885, the Chisholm Trail provided for the greatest migration of livestock in world history, moving more than five million cattle and a million mustangs from southern Texas through modern-day Montague County, across the Red River and on into Kansas, where the livestock was shipped by rail to market.

2017 meeting schedule
